Jason Chan is the owner and operator of Eastern Leaf, www.easternleaf.com, a bonsai retail and on-line store, carrying a wide variety of bonsai supplies and trees located nearby in Chino, California. Jason will do workshop on a Prostrata juniper in the Literati, or Bunjin style. The literati style of bonsai is meant to show the essence of a tree. This style has long flowing, often contorted trunk line, with branches reduced to a minimum. Jason will bring several trees to the meeting for people to work on, then the trees will be raffled off. Please bring your tools and wire to work on the trees. It will be fun!!! Come to the meeting and see if you will win the raffled tree that you worked on.




March Demonstrator - Jason Saito

Download an excellent article about saikei at https://bit.ly/3qbjhBC. This article gives information of the history, practice, supplies, recipe for all soils and muck, suppliers, and educational resources.



At our March meeting we were privileged to have Jason Saito as the featured demonstrator. <u>BUT</u> he didn't just do a demo, he directed two teams of people to create two different saikei arrangements, which were then donated to the raffle. A lot of fun and everyone had their fingers in the dirt, rocks, and plants.

These arrangements are not trivial. You can see that there are many components and decisions to make.





You can see that Jason setup two stations for each team to work. Both stations were the same but had



different kinds of rocks and the primary tree was either a juniper or boxwood. Incredible organized and planned with a lot of choices for us to make, he didn't forget a thing. On the left, gray/white one is Seiryu stone from AB Bonsai/GPS and on the right tufa rocks. Tufa rocks are lighter in weight but may not support weight of more rocks on top and if they get wet, it may disintegrate. Seiryu stone are heavy and may change color (get darker) after treatment with

muriatic acid. Seiryu stones are about \$1/pound or the darker colored one is about \$2/lb.





First step is the selection of stones. Look for

interesting shapes and forms, to make a rock arrangement. Redford Hunt and Nate Andersen look at rocks



Visualize. You want to make an arrangement that looks good from all angles (but also has a front) and also forms a overall triangle in shape with the rocks.

Stones can also be glued together in groups or on top of another. To glue stones together, mortar mix or Portland cement, is sprinkled where two sides of the stones fit together, then super glue

But in this
case, there
was a
problem. The
glue (it needs









to be stored in the fridge) didn't work (it wouldn't stick) so there was a change in plans. The rock arrangements had to be simplified and no rocks could be glued together. Lots more choices and rearranging of rocks and plants. After the racks were arranged to their liking, muck was used to pack in and lock in the rock placement (top left) by Dustin and Charleen. Then the third group of people came in to work on arranging the plants. You can see on the left that Greg and Johan have taken the plants out of the pots and are





trimming the roots to fit the space. Add potting soil and working it into the roots with chop sticks, fitting accent plants in different places. You can see the everyone got into the act and added their part to arrangement. Michael Roberts, Mike Kelly, Doyle, Gus and Bryan all contributed. Lots of great interaction among everyone so it made the meeting extra fun.





Above you can see Dustin working and even Doyle was doing his part to complete the arrangement. Jason was busy going to each station to give suggestions and pointers for arrangements and what to do next.

Jason brought several trays of collected moss, really nice moss. He showed us how to remove excess soil from the bottom and then to roll the edges of the pad of moss





toward the bottom so that it was a rounded form and also to make different sizes, and if you look later at the finished saikei, you can see how this contributes toward

looking like a native natural scene. Above right, one of the saikei with tufa rocks with just the plants arranged waiting for moss.









Proud winners Dustin Shang and Charleen Leong won and worked on this saikei. They did the muck part.







And Nate Andersen was the lucky winner of the other arrangement. He too worked on this one which was a lucky coincidence for both winners.
