




#### Bob Pressler, Demonstrator



We are very pleased to have Bob Pressler return to demo how to repot a plant. His humor and common sense approach to a sometimesmystical procedure was a refreshing approach.

He brought two plants, a nursery plant to a bonsai pot, and a tree already in a bonsai pot to another slightly larger bonsai pot.

First thing that needs to be done is to prepare the pot. The very first thing is to choose a pot, but to minimize the number of things he had to



bring, the nursery plant went into the old bonsai pot, and the plant that was already in a bonsai pot went into another pot. Pots need to be cleaned if it has been used before, then screen must be put over the drainage hole

On the top left, Bob is holding a wire that has been bent in a shape to be most stable in the pot. And as you


can see in the next set of pictures, the ends of the wire stick out from the bottom of the pot.





But Lindsay suggested that the wires be inserted the opposite way. So that the bent ends are on the bottom of the pot. The advantages of doing this is to prevent scratches onto the stand and it is less likely to catch on things.

This picture shows the bottom of the pot (left). The screen is gutter screen on sale from Home Depot or Lowes that he got on sale for cheap.



On the picture on the left, you can see the tie wires coming through the drain holes as well as wire that holds the screen. He puts two lengths of wire, through the holes. The wires are equal in length, but hang out of the pot in different lengths on each side (one end is longer than the other so each side has a long and short wire, Fig. 8). You can see the bottom of the pot from the picture above (Fig. 4).



The tie wires are important to tie down the tree to the pot. Bob ties each plant to a pot. During one of the earthquakes, some of his plants fell. The ones that had the plants tied down were intact but with the plants just set into the pot, the pots broke into several pieces and the root ball broke.

His soil mixture (Fig. 9) is scoria/lava and pumice (equal portions), no organics, a well-draining soil. Everything needs to be ready before starting to repot. Take the plant out of the pot and clean off the top of the soil and look at the roots.

The olive plant that was in the bonsai pot had a lot



of fine root hairs



and from this Bob though that the plantj was from a cutting. Comb out the roots in the direction that they were growing, trimming as necessary. Comb all around the plant, remove big roots and keep the fine roots. <u>Roots should not dry</u>. Position the plant off center in the pot on top of a layer of soil. After scooping in some soil around the plant, start working in the soil



with chop sticks (by poking and moving

in different directions), followed by sticking your finger (in the hole where the chop stick was) to work in the new soil in with the roots, so there are no voids or empty spaces in the soil (Fig 12). Empty spaces mean



places where the roots can die. Work the soil into the edges of the pot using a trowel so that there is a space at the edge of the pot can soak into the soil instead of running off (Fig 14) the surface.

Remember the tie wire (you can see them in Fig 12)? The wire needs need to be brought up and tied together (Fig. 13) from opposite directions. Then reconnected with another wire so that the plant is securely tied down in the pot (Fig. 15). Here you can see Bob tightening the tie down wires with jin pliers.

To

transplant a plant from a nursery pot, aside from



preparing the pot and soil, the most important thing is to comb all the



soil off the roots. If the plant is not healthy or a lot of large roots needs to be removed, then only remove half or a portion of the old soil at that time and at the next reporting time, only remove the old soil that was not removed before. Then trim off the roots so that the plant can fit

into the new pot.



Here, Bob is cleaning out the old soil from the bottom of the pot with a chop stick (Fig. 17).





Fig. 18 shows him fastening the juniper with the tie wires using jin pliers; Fig. 19, working in new soil with chop stick followed by his finger working in the soil so that there are no empty holes; and last Fig. 20 using a trowel to grade the edge of the soil to the pot so water does not drain off the top.

Water the plant so that all the soil is wet and water is draining out the drain holes. In the beginning, there may be fine particles "dust" from the planting mixture, this is good. Fine particles can interfere with good drainage so water till the water runs clear. Keep in the shade for about a week before putting it in the sun.
