

Tom Vuong, Demonstrator



We are pleased to have our own Tom Vuong as the featured demonstrator in February. A self-taught bonsai master of amazing trees (most of which are bigger and taller than he is). He is currently working as member of the curation team to work on select California Junipers at Huntington. Tom has continued working on the trees where he made major trunk and branch bends, and some of those have had their heavy tape and towel layers removed, and are now growing out in preparation for the next detailed wiring and trunk cleaning. Tom was also a demonstrator at the Golden State Bonsai Federation 2017 Bonsai-A-Thon.

For our club meeting, Tom presented his technique for grafting that in



his own words is "easy, cheap and it works".

Here are his main tools that he uses, from left to right: 1) various sizes of cable/tie tape, 2) Electrical tape (see larger picture below) available at hardware stores, (Home Depot, Amazon) in different widths. It stretches and seals to itself; 3) wood carving tool for use on tree stems in hard to reach areas, 4) grafting knife, he sharpens it each time he uses it.

On the left is an enlarged picture of the tape and the

First thing he does is to clean the foliage off the branch and keep leaves at the tip of the branch.







On the left is a juniper that he has begun to add scions to make the plant more compact and to change the foliage (from prostrata) to leaves that are more compact and smaller (Kishu shimpakiu) or to add a branch where it is needed.

Follow the sequence of pictures below: From left to right, top to bottom. 1) selecting a scion, 2) making the cut when you want to graft. Remember to cut away not toward you, about 1/3 of stem width;
















3) the scion is trimed to a "V" shape with one side slightly longer than the other, size can be smaller but not bigger then stem that it is grafted to; 4) scion is inserted; 5) the tape is stretched and wrapped at least 3x around the stem; 6-8) zip tape is wrapped and tightened then another set is wrapped in the opposite direction and tightened, ends are trimmed; 9) finished, the scion doen't and cannot move.



The scion and stem are sealed with the pruning sealer only at the top above the tape.

If the stem is large, then larger sized tie tape is used. This method is 60% of the method, after care is 40% of successful grafting.





Above are photos showing his placement of his fingers and hands in relationship to the knife. His <u>right-hand</u> <u>stays in one place</u> with the knife blade facing out. The flat side of the blade is always against the stem/branch. His <u>left-hand thumb pushes</u> against the blade in a smooth motion, his fingers providing steady pressure to achieve a clean cut. This way he has the most control of the knife and less chance of cutting himself and cutting correctly.

The entire plant is covered with a clear plastic bag (2-3mm thick, www.uline.com) for 2-3 months in 50-75% shade, 3-4 hr sun, and watering every month. If the tips of the scion are bright green, leave bag on but cut some holes in the bag. After about 6 months he cuts the tie tapes but does not remove the tape. One year later, he cuts one side of the tape so it can fall off. It is important not to the move the tree during this time. 1-2 years later the tree can be wired.

If you want to graft or add another branch from a potted plant, you can follow the same method with some modification. Position the branches and tie together, mark with ink the direction and location before taping and trimming. Follow the ink markings to orient the branches in the correct orientation.









In his example above, he has cut the bottom of the

branch he wants to graft to the

original plant. In practice, the plant would be intact and still growing in a pot, and the original stem/branch

would extend above. Wrap with the stretch tape, starting from the bottom. Put tie tape starting in the middle, then below and then on top. No need for pruning sealer.



Junipers can be grafted from January to April. Elms and oaks easy to graft. Black pine use candle as the scion for more success. Tape with parafilm. No need for shade, without the sun slower healing, graft from April to June.

Tom is always willing to help, call him for help anytime.

Tom donated the plant to the raffle which was won by Walter and Octivia.
