<u>Japanese traditional style</u> - we aspire to recreate what we see in nature

There is a lot to learn about Bonsai and it is very helpful to join at least one Bonsai Club AND to take classes. You will progress <u>much</u> faster with an instructor than self study.

What are characteristics of trees that make good bonsai material for a beginner?

Small leaves Dwarf varieties Good bark Hardy (hard to kill!)

What types of one-gallon material should beginners look for?

Procumbens nana juniper
Olive
Caitlin elm (small leaf sport of Chinese elm)
Ginkgo - 5 or 7 small ones make a nice group planting for beginners

### What makes a good Bonsai?


Good roots - strong, balanced
Nice taper of trunk from roots (wider) to top (thinner)
Good branch placement
Branches are thicker at bottom, gradually thinner and shorter at top
Good apex - strong or soft triangle
Bow to the front

No "reverse taper"
No bar branches
No crossing branches/trunks
No pigeon breast
No "eye pokers"

Healthy!
Well groomed
If wired - done neatly and not too tight or too loose




Chokkan - Formal Upright

Sokan - Twin Trunk




Shakan - Slant



Yose-ue - Forest




Ishizuke - Root over rock

### Hierarchy of Bonsai Trees

Pine

Juniper

Spruce

Deciduous

Flowering

Fruiting

## Types of pots used:

Evergreen (pine, junipers, olive, etc)

Deciduous or flowering/fruiting

For a strong, powerful tree

For a more feminine, graceful tree

unglazed brown, tan or grey

glazed blue, green, cream, etc

strong, straight sided rectangle

Softer, rounded rectangle or oval

### Essential tools

Trimming scissors
Concave cutter - branch cutter
Wire cutter
Aluminum wire
Chopsticks!

## Other tools as you progress

Knob cutter

Root cutter

Tweezers

Turn table with "stop" (6" plastic cupboard lazy susan works fine at the beginning) Larger sizes of basic tools

<u>Soil Mix, Watering and Fertilizer</u> - Your instructor will be your best resource - he or she will know your trees and your growing conditions - here are some general tips:

Use a good draining soil mix - water often - fertilize regularly

Cactus Mix is a good starter for soil - our club members can offer other suggestions

Organic fertilizers are gentle; use miracle grow or other water soluble ones at 1/2 strength.
